## From the Principal

It is the time of the year when senior students are choosing elective subjects and/or courses of study for future years. Staff continue to stress the importance of students choosing subjects that they find enjoyable and interesting. We all have our favourites, but it is also important that a breadth of studies is undertaken.

At the recent VTAC Information evening for Year 12 students and parents, the Careers staff presented useful information so that wise and informed choices can be made.

During the past fortnight we have been delighted to hear of the activities and achievements of students. You will read about these in another part of the newsletter.

Four Year 8 students represented the College at the 'Uniting Through Faith' conference. They were Elissa Ozenc, Kavindya Ranawaka Arachchige, Sharini Arachchige and Thisara Dematampitiya. I was most interested to hear their report on the experience which included going to Government House and meeting the governor's wife Mrs Jan de Krester. The girls met

delegates from Indonesia as well as students from other Uniting Church schools and discussed faith issues in order to gain a better understanding of different religious faiths. They even got to practice their Indonesian.

**Scholarships:** Students in Senior School will be invited to apply for (1) Foundation Scholarship (a full year's scholarship which covers all tuition fees. This is provided by the Board for academic achievement and contributions to the College) and (2) Friends of the Arts Scholarships (The Friends of the Arts offer these scholarships which consist of payment of fees associated with external studies of the arts) for those students wishing to pursue further studies whilst they are attending Aitken. ## Brookhill School Notices

**VCE Subject Selection:** Year 10 and 11 students have just completed their online selection of VCE subjects for next year. It is very important that the right choices are made at this point. All students have had access to first-class careers and subject advice from senior teaching staff and the careers teachers. I hope that everyone is happy and settled with the decisions that they have made. However, if any student is still a little unsure about their intended course, I encourage them to keep asking questions; it is much easier to change a subject at this stage than a month into next year!

There has been considerable interest from Year 10 students wishing to study a Unit 3-4 (Year 12) in Year 11 next year. Careful thought needs to be given to this. While studying a Year 12 subject ahead of time can help some students with their ATAR scores, this is not for everyone; the majority of students are far better off studying a full Year 11 program at Year 11 to fully prepare for the rigours of Year 12.

It must be noted that entry to a Year 12 subject in Year 11 is not automatic. All students who have applied to do so will have their applications vetted by Mr Murphy (Head of Senior School) and Mr McKay (VCE Co-ordinator). Students will only be granted entry to a subject ahead of time if it is in their best academic interests. It should also be noted that some combinations of Year 12 subjects with Year 11 subjects may not be feasible due to timetable constraints.

**Year 11 Presentation Ball:** This year's annual Presentation Ball is approaching fast. Dance lessons are going very well; it is fantastic to see the progression of the students as they learn their dance presentations. Ball tickets are now available for collection from the Senior School office.

Information has been sent home about online viewing of photos. Can families please ensure that participating students have provided correct email and phone contact details via the information sheets available at dance lessons.

## Dunhelen School Notices

**Behaviour:** This week marks the halfway point of Term 3. I just cannot believe how quickly this year is flying by! Overall, I am very happy with students' general behaviour in Dunhelen and encourage all students to keep up the great work. However, the boys in Dunhelen have increasingly become involved in rough and inappropriate boisterous play during recess and lunchtime breaks. Unfortunately, this has led to a few minor injuries and emotional distress for some students. Most students do not understand that such rough-house play can easily escalate into misunderstanding and retaliation. The College has implemented a clear procedure to counsel and warn all the boys in Dunhelen that this sort of behaviour must stop immediately. Teachers on yard duty have been instructed to report any boy(s) who break this rule in any manner. As a result, there will be severe consequences for any student ignoring this ruling.

**Any physical contact which is deemed to be beyond normal, expected considerate interactions between students will not be tolerated. There is to be no shoving, pushing, jumping upon another student, tripping or sliding into another student, even if the intent is not malicious.**

Obviously I realise that young boys enjoy some level of physical interaction but I cannot allow this sort of behaviour to continue. I wish to ensure that while your child is at school he is safe and happy, and remains uninjured.

I would appreciate you speaking with your child about the inappropriateness of such rough play. I thank you for your assistance in this matter.

**Homework:** Now that Parent Teacher Interviews have once again come and gone, I would like to remind parents that all students should be doing some form of homework every night. This may be working on assignments, studying for tests, silent reading, or general revision. This will allow your child to form good study habits and keep up with their workload during busier periods.

**World Vision 40-hour Famine:** This weekend, many Dunhelen students will give up one (or more) of life's comforts in order to raise money for this year's World Vision 40-hour Famine. Traditionally, Dunhelen students have been avid supporters of this worthy cause, and this year promises to be no different. **Behaviour Framework in the College:** A disciplined framework enables students, teachers and parents to recognise whether student behaviour is or is not at an acceptable level and provides a procedure to rectify this. The unified efforts of parents and teachers are effective in successfully modifying children's behaviour. Children will be encouraged to be responsible for their own behavior at all times and will be positively rewarded for successfully achieving high standards of acceptable performance. The discipline framework of the College has been established to allow the best possible scope for students to develop qualities of self-discipline, which they will carry through into their later lives. Parents are expected to support the discipline plan implemented; it is

imperative that a partnership approach is established to achieve a positive outcome. (Please refer to your Parent Information Booklet)
