Year 8 City Experience

For four days during the week of Monday 28 August to Friday 1 September students from Year 8 made their way into Melbourne's CBD to experience all the city has to offer. The inaugural Year 8 City Experience was hugely rewarding and enjoyable for all involved, giving students the chance to independently travel on public transport and then explore the city they may never have visited before.

Students were given a small list of 'places of interest' they had to visit, such as the iconic MCG, the vibrant graffiti in Hosier Lane and the Shrine of Remembrance; all places that make Melbourne the colourful and multi-faceted city it is. Whilst travelling within the city, students made use of the tram network to ease the amount of walking they had to do, which also gave them plenty of time throughout the day for coffees, hot chocolates or a little bit of shopping. All students visited the 88th floor of the Eureka Skydeck, where, thanks to clear and sunny weather throughout the week, amazing views of the city and beyond were visible. Some students chose to experience 'The Edge', hovering 300 metres over Melbourne in a glass cube. As well as visiting Eureka Skydeck, all students undertook a workshop at 'The Big Issue Classroom'. Students were educated on homelessness, common misconceptions and the issues surrounding many people in our society today. Students were able to hear directly from someone who had experienced homelessness and successfully turned around their lives towards a brighter future.

By the end of the week, students had gained a greater sense of confidence in their ability to independently travel into and around the city, and I hope they are able to transfer these skills to their lives outside of school with their families.

I would like to thank all the Year 8 Homeroom teachers, Mrs Camilleri, Ms Sadler, Mr Oreo, Mr McGregor and Mr Gunarathna, who worked tirelessly to prepare the students for the City Experience, without them it simply would not have been such a great experience for all involved.

Year 5 Initiative - Eat Up Australia: Eat Up is an Australian not-for-profit organisation that helps feed hungry disadvantaged school kids. The program was started by Lyndon Galea, when he read about students going to school without lunch. His first drop off of 100 cheese and vegemite sandwiches in 2013 has grown to supply 47 schools in Victoria, 30 of which are in Melbourne. The students in Year 5, on hearing about students coming to school without food and the Eat Up Australia Project wanted to join.



The students will be coming early to school 2 mornings over the remainder of the school year, and will make 500 sandwiches each time. The sandwiches are then frozen and ready for distribution. The Year 5 students will also be holding a number of fundraising events for the purchase of bread, cheese, vegemite so that we can fund our activities, allowing the Eat Up Australia project to produce more sandwiches elsewhere. The VU Bus Visited Aitken College: Aitken was chosen as the first school to receive a visit from VU staff and their newly fitted out bus on Friday 18 August. Although the weather was not particularly welcoming, a steady stream of enthusiastic Brookhill students passed through its doors. Students were able to chat to VU Recruitment staff, collect brochures and information, take part in some competitions and win prizes. The bus is showcasing the new 'First Year VU Model', commencing in 2018, where students will continue to study 4 subjects each semester in first year, but study them one at a time. So students complete one subject before progressing to the next and the timetable is set up to manage this process. To illustrate the model, students were encouraged to take part in a juggling competition, where it became very obvious it was easy to juggle 1 ball at a time, a little harder to juggle 2 and much much harder to juggle 3 or 4 balls – like trying to juggle 4 subjects at once. One intrepid student did manage a '4 ball juggle' and received a prize. This was a wonderful example of the outreach to local schools being undertaken by VU and provided a great opportunity for senior students to access useful information about VU without having to leave College premises.

Tournament of Minds - 2017

On Sunday 27 August, fourteen students from Aitken College participated in the Tournament of Minds problem-solving competition at La Trobe University in Bundoora. We entered two teams of Year 7 -10 students in the Secondary Division. Our teams registered in the Social Sciences and Engineering / Mathematics categories, respectively. Both teams were faced with two extremely complex challenges that required them to present unique explanations and interpretations of a variety of issues within a specific time limit.

The students had six weeks to work together on their Long-Term Challenge without the assistance from teachers, parents, or peers. With a strong emphasis on teamwork and the ability to use critical thinking skills for problem solving, Tournament of Minds required the students to work together developing original solutions, working within predefined parameters such as limited materials, intricate challenge criteria, and the deadline of Tournament Day. The teams also participated in an unseen 'Spontaneous Challenge' on the Day. This challenge required the rapid interchange of ideas, the ability to think creatively, and well-developed group cooperation skills.

It was a fabulous day with both our teams producing their best efforts. The students worked tirelessly during training and throughout the challenge for two terms, both during school and after hours. I commend them on their sensational performances on the day in both the Long-Term and Spontaneous challenges, and I wish to extend my congratulations to all the students for their unwavering hard work over the two terms. All fourteen students who participated in Tournament of Minds grew in both personal and social confidence; they led, planned, and accomplished a significant project on their own terms. Maturity, independence, thoughtfulness, considerate working relationships and courage were all skills that were nurtured throughout Tournament of Minds.

Harry Bell Memorial Art Competition - Beersheba 100 Years: Theme - Mates and the contribution of the ANZAC horses and riders in WW1. Congratulations to Kaitlyn Haigh in Year 10 who was shortlisted for the Beersheba Harry Bell Memorial Art Competition. Her acrylic painting was placed seventh out of thirty finalists. She received a limited-edition print from a judge and attended the ceremony to announce the winners. The top prize-winning entries were displayed at the Caulfield Race Course event on 19 August. The public will be able to view the exhibition anytime until November at the Caulfield RSL, 4 St Georges Road, Elsternwick.

Background About The Battle of Beersheba: After trekking through the desert for 3 nights with little water, the town of Beersheba on the eastern flank of the Turkish Line stretching from Gaza had to be taken in one day to capture the water supply for the men and horses. The British bombarded the trenches in the morning, the New Zealanders fought gamely to take the high point of Tel el Saba, but by mid-afternoon the town was still strongly held. General Chauvel opted for a do-or-die charge with two regiments of Australian Light Horse (about 800 men and horses). They charged 6 km over open rocky ground in the full face of the entrenched Turks, artillery and machine gun fire and German bomber aircraft, jumping the trenches and galloping into town just before most of the mined wells could be blown up. Against incredible odds only 31 were killed, 36 injured and 70 horses died. Their reckless courage stunned the opposition and secured their place forever as ‘the last great cavalry charge in history’. This was the pivotal event in a largely successful campaign in the Sinai, Palestine and Syria which led to the collapse of the Ottoman Empire and the re-writing of the map of the Middle East.

136,000 horses went to war and only one returned. There were 32,000 Australian men and 40,000 horses in the Palestinian campaign and the casualties were 1,394 dead and 4,851 wounded. This competition seeks to remember them as a special centenary tribute. It is named after Harold Thomas Bell (alias Wickham) who enlisted in the Light Horse at 16 years old (claiming to be 21), joined the troops just before Beersheba, died from wounds to his leg from the charge and is buried in the Beersheba War Cemetery.
